The <u>E-Humanities Working Group</u> from the <u>All European Academies</u> (ALLEA) opened a consultation on "Recommendations for Sustainable and FAIR Data Sharing in the Humanities", open to all till 15th July 2019.

In an effort to support Open Science practices in the humanities, the working group has drafted recommendations for humanities researchers working with data, seeking contributions from researchers and practitioners working in disciplines within the humanities, as well as policy makers and representatives of public and private organisations working in the field. The purpose of the open consultation is to gather broad feedback from active humanities researchers, in order to best tailor FAIR recommendations to the humanities.
